# 6. Business Arising from the Minutes

#### a) Active Transportation Plan (ATP)

David assigned as PTASC-ATP development liaison, provided update from consultant at Urban Systems (Beth).

- Tasks completed: Background review and District visit
- Upcoming tasks: facilities inventory, public engagement
  - o Any PTASC or Metchosin volunteers to join booth at public events
- Beth requested GIS data of Metchosin trails/facilities?
  - o Noted today's printed maps use GIS, so staff should have copies of this. Also noted that GAIA website/app has existing trails within it.
- More information will be coming on the ATP process.

#### b) Memorial Bench

Application not received, expected for next month's PTASC meeting.

#### c) Beckingham Road Subdivision Trail

- Discussion of "dogleg" that goes into wet/riparian area (NE corner). Concern on difficulty to build and maintain?
  - o Developer to build the whole trail.
  - o Concerns the plan will change (e.g., identify further riparian area).
  - O Discussion on ensuring trail in wetland/riparian area is properly constructed (bridge/boardwalk discussed).
- Discussion of multi-use versus. Nature trail, particularly steep part at beginning
  - Seems less likely for cyclists or equestrian use, would have increased maintenance costs.
  - o Consensus achieved on recommending a modified multi-use trails (gravel but the width of a natural trail).
- Committee unclear if subdivision is approved, would PTASC recommendations change anything?
- Recommended that developer involve and consult the Parks & Trails Coordinator about the trail design to ensure trail & crossing of wet/riparian area is acceptable to Metchosin.
- Beckingham emergency access road could allow for future trail connection with Blinkhorn Mtn (e.g., via Parry Bay Sheep/Lindholm Farm). Discussion about adding to the P&T Master plan update.
  - Firstly, seek clarification on whom will own fire/emergency road? Would it allow for trail if Metchosin owns it?
  - Secondly, request developer to allow public or resident access to the fire/emergency road and dedicate it to allow for future trail development.
- Proposed benefit: access or trail connect would prevent overgrowth of vegetation

**Action:** PTASC to provide recommendations to CAO by 12-June. **PTASC to share and agree on wording to CAO by email.** Can be sent to CAO when agreed and then adopted at June PTASC meeting.

#### 7. Reports

#### a) Parks and Trails Coordinator

- Metchosin Wilderness Park repaired, kudos to Gord, Jim, and Metchosin Public Works
- Increased interest in having PTASC recommended possible Memorial Bench sites
- Duke Road bench is moving forward
- Duke Road Survey terms provided to CAO

Action: Requested for Jay to ask CAO to provide that Parks & Trails Coordinator gets final review of Tender Documents

- Westmont providing Volunteers for trail cleanup. Need guidance from "qualified" individual on cleanup/invasives removal. This can be anyone from PTASC
- Public works received new information from seminar on mitigation of European Ash in Blinkhorn Nature Park. Public works looking to hire herbicide applicator, or get one trained on Public Works staff, to connect Public Works with MISC.

  - o Community Planning Committee had discussions on managing land & access.
  - Council decided not going forward with CRD discussions. Will look further into BLWG recommendations.

- Weirs Beach stairs, still waiting for the contractor to start.

The meeting was called to order at 7:01 p.m.

The Chair provided a Territorial Acknowledgement.

# 1. Agenda, Additions and Approval

**Moved and Seconded** by Councillor Shukin and Mayor Little to approve the agenda as amended with the addition of a presentation by Mike Butcher, Arborist, regarding Lombardy Poplar Trees on Lombard Drive.

**Carried** 

#### 2. Presentations

Mike Butcher, Consulting Arborist and President of SouthShore Forest Consultants, addressed Council and provided a summary of his background and an overview of the Tree Risk Assessment Report on the Lombardy Poplar Trees dated March 15, 2024 including:

- Site assessment
- Number and status of Lombardy Poplars on Lombard Drive
- Options to address current defects and future issues
- Risks
- Recommendations

#### Committee discussion:

- Replacement trees
- Pruning and maintenance versus removal
- Tree removal, stump removal, soil mitigation
- Dangers and risks
- Life cycle of Lombardy Poplars
- Existing damage and defects

Councillor Shukin invited members of the gallery to address the presenter. Katy Nelson, resident, inquired if it is biologically necessary for there to be tall trees along Lombard Drive and the use of native trees and shrubs.

# 3. Public Participation

Pattie Whitehouse, resident, urged the Committee to think about what is good for pollinators when considering tree replacement options.

Adopted: \*\*, 2024

John Tipton, resident, noted that his Great Grandfather planted the Lombardy Poplar trees, expressed concerns that the trees should have been maintained, and suggested restoring and retaining the existing trees in sections.

Elva Kennedy, resident, encouraged the Committee to only remove the diseased poplars, leave the young poplars growing, and plant more poplars so that residents of and visitors to Metchosin can continue to enjoy this heritage site.

Robert Patterson, resident and former member and Chair of the Heritage Advisory Select Committee, provided an overview of the Statement of Significance of the Lombard Road Poplar Grove, including the heritage values, description of the historical place, and character defining elements and history.

Darren Brown, resident, expressed concerns regarding the lack of community engagement and consultation on the Duke Road trail project, indicated that resident concerns could have been addressed through consultation, and suggested that Council reset and reaffirm commitment to transparency and a collaborative relationship with the community.

June Reimer, resident, spoke to concerns regarding the Duke Road trail and implications for the District, questioned the survey, and suggested that all residents should be consulted, rather than just one group.

## 3. Public Participation

Brent Donaldson spoke about the tax exemption for the Victoria Motorcycle Club. He is a member of the Victoria Motorcycle Club which owns more than 100 acres of undeveloped property on Boulderpath Road. Brent has been a director of the club for 15 years and if anyone has questions about the tax exemption feel free to contact him.

Kathy Atherton wanted to bring two items up for discussion. First, the Beckingham Road development proposal, which she is mystified about why the developer has put lots up for sale when the subdivision hasn't been approved yet. Kathy feels this is "putting the cart before the horse" and finds it problematic. She also pointed out that many of the proposed lots have building sites encroaching on riparian zones (especially lot 8), and the area designated for parks and trails is located particularly close to riparian zones and sensitive moss bald areas.

Kathy also wanted to discuss herbicides and pesticides. She has a Habitat Acquisition Trust (HAT) 'Good Neighbours' designation on her property and is involved with the Metchosin Invasive Species Cooperative (MISC). Kathy thinks treating holly with a spot dab on the trunk after cutting should still be allowed. She is concerned with changing parameters, as we must bear in mind reasonable applications to allow the good work of invasive species control to continue.

### 6. Business Arising from the Minutes

#### a) Human/Wildlife Conflict

A joint Special Meeting with PTASC & MEASC is scheduled for July 9<sup>th</sup>.

#### b) Climate Action Plan – Community Engagement

Merrilee contacted Karyn Woodland, from Regenerate BC, looking at education programs with either a Metchosin focus or including Metchosin residents. Karyn brought this up at their board meeting last night and the other members sounded keen to participate in any Metchosin-related activities or to include Metchosin residents in any regional events. Regenerate BC is offering an online five-week course on climate solutions beginning in Sept/Oct, and they are also happy to offer an in-person version of same course, possibly at Royal Roads, the Metchosin Community House, or somewhere in Colwood - a convenient location for Metchosinites to attend is the goal. It would be great if we could encourage Metchosinites to attend through various channels (Muse articles, Facebook groups, District Website).

Steve offered to talk to staff about putting this on the district website and Merrilee said she would get something in the Muse and on social media. There was a Letter to the Editor written for the June 2024 Muse about the Climate Action Plan making progress and ways to get involved on an individual basis.

**Action Item:** Steve will talk to staff about putting on district website.

**Action Item:** Merrilee will get an article into the Muse and post in various social media groups.

#### c) Beckingham Subdivision Referral

Steve gave an update on a group effort from Steve, Ric, and Erin who put together a list of recommendations with input from wetland and terrestrial ecosystem experts including Provincial ecosystems biologist, Sacha O'Regan, from Ministry of Water, Land, and Resource Stewardship. Sacha has worked with the District before and has offered to put together a team of provincial experts on wetlands and riparian areas to advise on best practices to assist our Approving Officer.

We discussed and made edits to our list of recommendations and reviewed the Hewitt Creek Groundwater Assessment.

# b) Council Liaison Verbal Report

Buffer Lands: A motion was passed to bring the Buffer Land Working Group Report to an upcoming meeting of the Planning Committee to discuss recommendations from the working group. There was also some discussion around engaging with the Capital Regional District (CRD) about a potential sale of the Buffer Lands.

Bill spoke about the need to keep biosolids from being spread on land in Metchosin. He recalled some of the history on this topic as it relates to the CRD who had committed to a ban on land application years ago. He noted that the option of land application is under consideration again and the CRD is seeking input.

**Moved and Seconded** by Bill and Andy that the Committee recommend a ban on land application of biosolids in Metchosin.

#### a) 2013 Shoreline Protection Plan

Steve talked to Councillor David Grove and Director of Planning, Ian Bourhill at City of Colwood. Colwood is happy to liaise with Metchosin about their shoreline plan so that the two communities could work together on adjoining shoreline areas – two key areas are sea level rise and tsunami.

A question arose about whether we talk to HAT again about their 'Good Neighbours Program' and engaging with Metchosin shoreline property owners; can we get a report on what happened last time?

**Action Item:** Andy will contact Habitat Acquisition Trust to request a report on their landowners contact program for shoreline residents.

**Action Item:** Steve will touch base again with Colwood's Councillor Grove to arrange a follow-up meeting on shoreline planning.

# c) District of Metchosin Public Works Policy W-100: Elimination of Pesticides and Herbicides for Cosmetic Purposes on Municipal Grounds

The Committee needs direction from the Environment Committee on this; we had ideas of expanding from cosmetic purposes and expanding from municipal properties. Control of Black Knapweed using hand-sprayed herbicides on Tower Point has been successful. Exceptions for invasives in the policy are needed.

**Moved and Seconded** by Andy and Steve that the Environment Committee consider expanding Policy W-100 to apply beyond cosmetic use and expand beyond use on municipal grounds.

### d) Tax Exempt Properties

It is important that these properties have no resource extraction, no logging, no road building, no tree cutting, and take into account the value to the community for tax exemption. Do these properties need a covenant? Do they require a change in zoning? What are the criteria?

**Action Item:** Andy and Steve to work together to come up with some criteria for tax exempt properties in Metchosin for our next MEASC meeting.

#### e) Spongy Moth Spraying Program

We have questions about the adjuvants used in pesticide formulas. What justification there is for spraying? Steve had received correspondence from Metchosin resident, Jochen Moehr, who is a butterfly enthusiast and says he is concerned about insect populations.

Action Item: Erin to research this and report findings at next MEASC meeting.

# **Suggested Locations:**

- 1. Location to be suggested by donor.
- 2. Please note, Weir Beach, Taylor Beach, Sea Bluff Trail, and Blinkhorn Nature Park locations are full.

# **Application Process:**

- 1. Staff receives the application.
- 2. Application is scanned and emailed to the Parks & Trails Coordinator at <a href="maileotrails-coordinator@metchosin.ca">trails-coordinator@metchosin.ca</a>. Trails Coordinator will contact the applicant to discuss bench or table placement.
- 3. Copy of the application is placed into the Parks & Trails Advisory Select Committee upcoming meeting file. PTASC to review application, proposed location, and plaque wording.
- 4. The Trails Coordinator will refer the application to the Chief Administrative Officer, Fire Chief and Public Works. A referral will be made to the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure (Highway 14 only).
- 5. Pending input and approval from all parties above, the Trails Coordinator will refer the application to Council for review and approval.
- 6. The Trails Coordinator will gather an updated quote.
- 7. If Council approves, staff to receive the donation fee from the applicant.
- 8. Once application is approved, staff to order bench/table and plaque from respective designated suppliers. As of September 2023, the approved suppliers are:
  - i. Bench/table: Classic Cedar (250-474-7611);
  - ii. Plaque: Achinbach (250-474-0037)
- 9. Courier completed plaque to the bench/table supplier to install.
- 10. The Trails Coordinator to coordinate pouring a concrete pad. Must be between 4'x8' to 8'x8' in size.
- 11. Classic Cedar to install bench or table on concrete pad.

12. The Trails Coordinator to coordinate maintenance.

# **Donation Amount:**

- 1. A current quote for materials and installation services will be required for every new application. The Trails Coordinator will gather the quote.
- 2. A maintenance fee of 20% of material costs will be added. Maintenance fees must be renewed every ten years.
- 3. For reference, the total cost of a bench including maintenance in 2023 was roughly \$2,600.

# **Duke Road East Feasibility Assessment**

Prepared by a sub-committee of Metchosin's Parks and Trails Advisory Select Committee (PTASC) - February 17, 2023 (updated: March 5, 2024)

In November 2023, PTASC established a sub-committee to assess the potential of a roadside trail along Duke Road East. The sub-committee includes Ron Aubrey (PTASC Chair), Ryan Carter (Trails Coordinator) and Jay Shukin (Councillor). The sub-committee assessed:

- Immediate and long-term value of a roadside trail.
- Interest/support from neighbours and the broader community.
- Technical feasibility (route, rights of way, constraints).
- Constructability and initial budget considerations.

# 1.0 Summary:

- Strong neighbour interest exists in developing this trail. High trail usage is expected. Volunteer labour and resource contributions during construction are expected.
- There is broader community value in developing the trail, both in supporting active transportation, and addressing existing traffic/pedestrian safety issues.
- Large portions of Duke Road East have well defined road shoulders allowing for relatively easy trail construction; other sections present construction challenges.
- Most of these challenges can be addressed through careful planning/budgeting (provincial grants), and dialogue with neighbours/stakeholders.
- A survey is required to confirm an optimal route.
- Several neighbours have raised concerns about a trail: privacy, drainage, potential impacts to trees, increased pedestrian (& dog) and bike activity.
- Overall, trail development will be a multi-year endeavour and require on-going neighbour engagement.

# 2.0 Background

- An excellent roadside trail exists along the lower (southern) portion of Duke Road
   East on the north side from Gilbert Dr to the corner where the road turns northward.
- The first segment of the proposed trail would begin where that trail ends, along a 1.2km stretch of Duke Road East. Orientation:
  - Duke Road East generally runs north (toward Metchosin Road) and south (toward Duke Road West).
  - The trail route is being considered for the west (in-land side) and east (ocean side) sides of Duke Road East.
- The goal is for a multi-use (walking, cycling, powerchair) trail of one metre in width per the standards in the Trails Master Plan in Metchosin's Official Community Plan.
- There are ~50 homes on both the east and west side of Duke Road East.

#### 3.0 Local Interest

The desire for a trail along Duke Road East has support going back many years. Recently, a neighbourhood group has renewed interest, working to build support and awareness with residents along the route and in the broader area. Over 150 signatures in support of the trail have been collected. The neighbourhood group attended and contributed to PTASC meetings throughout 2023/24 and has engaged the subcommittee during this process. This group continues to engage neighbours on relevant matters, including privacy issues, landscaping and maintenance.

# 4.0 Community Value

The sub-committee sees broad community value in a trail along Duke Road East:

#### High use

- A trail is expected to be well-used with over 50 homes on Duke Road East, with connections to Chapel Heights Drive, Albert Head Road and Dutnall Road.
- Outside of the village area, this may be one of Metchosin's most frequently travelled roadside pedestrian routes.

### Active transportation

 Resident input indicates that many currently walk, cycle, or connect with public transit along the shoulders of Duke Road East. A multi-use trail will improve accessibility.

## Improved safety.

- Road sections of Duke Road East are narrow, with stretches that can lead to high vehicle speed (no signage or other traffic calming measures exist), particularly in the south-bound (downhill) direction.
- There is regular traffic along Duke Road East to and from CFB Albert Head.
- Marked road shoulders either do not exist or are narrow (less than 3ft at best) for most of Duke Road East.
- Duke Road East is an access road to Witty's Lagoon Regional Park, and traffic is expected to increase with residential development in Colwood.

#### **5.0 Phased Development**

The trail is proposed for development in three phases within a multi-year process (see map). The subcommittee believes that the first phase can be constructed relatively easily and within one year. However, phases 2 and 3 present varying degrees of challenge. The subcommittee believes that determining an optimal route for phases 2 and 3 will require completion of a survey.

In general terms, the three phases would be:

# Phase 1 (south segment) – Existing Duke Road Trail to Chapel Heights Drive

- Segment begins on the west side of Duke Road East, where the existing trail ends, and continuing for 270 metres.
- The west side is highly constructable, but must consider existing drainage infrastructure, modest slope and several trees.

# Phase 2 (middle segment) - Chapel Heights Drive to Dutnall Road

- Segment is ~460 metres.
- A survey is required to determine the optimal route, with respect to available shoulder allowance, safety, neighbour impacts, constructability, vegetation clearing.
- The section from Chapel Heights Dr. to Albert Head Rd (~212 metres) includes narrow parcel of land under title to the BC Transportation Financing Authority (BCTFA). Further investigation on potential use is required, pending survey results.

# <u>Phase 3 (north segment)</u> – Dutnall Road toward Metchosin Rd and the Latoria Creek Community Bridge at Farhill Road

- Segment is ~460 metres and would conclude at the Latoria Creek Community Bridge at Farhill Road.
- As with Phase 2, a survey is required to determine an optimal route.

# 6.0 Construction Process and Trail Design

Per normal practice, trail construction would be led by PTASC and supported by Metchosin public works, volunteers and, where necessary, donated materials, equipment and other resources. The construction plan and schedule for each phase would be reviewed and approved by District staff.

From discussion with known contractors and former PTASC members with significant trail building experience, the following approach to trail construction is recommended:

- Width of 1 metre
- Excavation of ~4 inches followed by
  - A layer of weed barrier
  - 3 inches of three-quarter crush gravel.
  - o 1 inch of "screenings" or one-quarter inch minus material.

#### 7.0 Additional considerations

## Crosswalk

It's expected that one crosswalk will be needed to shift the trail from west side of Duke Road East to the east side, based on safety and shoulder allowances.

### Utilities

Water, drainage and natural gas lines exist along certain portions of the trail route. The location and depth of these lines to be confirmed prior to any construction work.

# **BC** Transit

Six bus stops exist along Duke Road East, including three stops within phase one. It's recommended that discussions occur with BC transit on consolidating these stops and looking for overall safety improvements.

### Liability

At this stage, there does not appear to be any significant liability issues for the District. Liability risk will continue to be assessed as the project develops.


#### 8.0 Final Assessment and Recommendation

The sub-committee believes that a roadside trail along Duke Road East is of strong local and community value, and that this can be achieved through a multi-year, phased approach. As such the following is recommended:

- \$10,000 toward focused survey of Duke Road East; and,
- \$10,000 toward the construction of Phase One.

Upon Council approval, PTASC will coordinate with the District's Chief Administrative Officer and staff in developing a detailed workplan for a survey and phase one construction.
